I was also given an option to continue with the order, or to cancel it altogether. Either way I had to open an attached link so as to enlighten the company whether or not it wanted me to proceed. Knowing that I had never ordered any metal sheets, and being vigilant, I considered the mail to be suspicious and transferred it to my junk folder, hopefully never to receive it again. I can't imagine what would have occurred had I opened the link. This isn't the first dubious email I have received, and I suspect it won't be the last. I would also suggest that those of us who have email accounts will have received similar communications from people that they are unsure about.

We are living in an uncertain world. Wars are raging in the Middle East, Russia, Ukraine, Israel and Palestine. We are all worried about the future, not only for ourselves but for our families, young and old, growing up in a world which seems to be getting worse. Climate change, and trying to make ends meet, are all ongoing issues, and nobody seems to have an answer. I am aware that steps are being taken to change our attitudes regarding the use of energy, and becoming carbon neutral, but all this takes time and great expense, and if we don't get it right, what will this planet of ours be like in 100 years' time? In addition we have a society where young people don't feel safe unless they are carrying weapons to protect themselves, and think nothing trying to kill each other, despite the consequences. In (Micha 2:3) we read, "Alas for those who devise wickedness and evil deeds on their beds! When the morning dawns, they perform it, because it is in their power. They covet fields, and seize them; houses, and take them away; they oppress householder and house, people and their inheritance. Therefore, thus says the Lord: Now, I am devising against this family an evil from which you cannot remove your necks; and you shall not walk haughtily, for it will be an evil time."

When Jesus was asked which commandment in the law was the greatest he answered, 'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind." This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: "You shall love your neighbour as yourself." On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets.' (Matthew 22:37-40). What is it then that prompts people to fight against one another, cheat people so that they can gain money by illegal means, and take no notice about the wonderful world that God created? It seems to me that if these two commandments are disregarded we are destined to have to put up with the status quo which, as time goes by, will only get worse.





## Mr Bates vs The Post Office: not the only one

"We're here because the Post Office told every single one of us sat here today, told us over and over, 'You're the only one.' And that was wrong. That was a lie, actually. Because... well, look at us. Here we all are. And from this moment forwards, none of us will be the only one ever again."

By now, most of us know what the Post Office did all those years ago. It's hard to believe that hundreds of innocent sub-postmasters were repeatedly lied to and prosecuted in what has been called 'the biggest miscarriage of justice in British legal history'.

Yet when Horizon, the computer system rolled out to each post office, incorrectly showed huge account shortfalls, these were blamed on sub-postmasters. They were told that nobody else had any issues, that they were the only one.

Except that they weren't – and the Post Office knew this.

But still the Post Office went ahead and prosecuted these sub-postmasters. Some went bankrupt, some went to prison, some committed suicide.

The anger and outcry against the Post Office is welcome. The cry for justice is right. We all want to live in a society where justice is done.

As Jules Gadsby of the London Institute for Contemporary Christianity says: "As Christians, this should be close to our hearts. The Lord is a God of justice. Righteousness and justice are the foundation of his throne (Psalm 89:14).

"And Christ stands by those who suffer. He doesn't look on from a distance, but as one who, at the cross, has experienced it Himself.

"It's through His people, reflecting His character and His priorities, that He reveals this.

"We may never have to battle like Alan Bates and the sub-postmasters. But each of us will, in some way, be called to be a mouthpiece for truth and justice in our workplaces, homes, or community.

"In doing so, we show what God is like. And we show those facing unfairness and injustice that they're not alone. We are there with them. God is there with them."



#### St Mary's Sunday School

We finished January with a session about Jesus' first miracle at the Wedding of Cana, where He turned water into wine. After talking about our favourite drinks, the children enjoyed tasting a variety of drinks and guessing what they were - and most of them guessed right! We then focused on the amazing miracle itself with a 'practical demonstration' and a craft activity to remind us of the story and of the fact that God can do absolutely anything!

In early February we had a session about the Transfiguration of Jesus, in preparation for our all-age service the following Sunday. We started by looking for shiny things (coins) around the hall, and realised that some of them were actual (plastic) coins, while others were chocolate ones - you can guess which ones were more popular! As the children would later find out, the shiny appearance of Jesus on the mountain would confirm to the disciples that Jesus really was the true Son of God! We also tested our listening skills with a game of Chinese whispers, because the disciples heard God's voice saying that Jesus was His beloved son and that they should listen to Him. We talked about ways in which we can listen to Jesus, eg in prayer or by reading the Bible, especially the 'Red Letter Bible' which has all the words Jesus spoke printed in red, and we thought about specific things Jesus said, eg 'Follow me,' 'Love one another as I have loved you,' 'Love God and love your neighbour as yourself,' 'Let your light shine' as well as 'Come to me, all who are weary and heavy laden, and I will give you rest.' The children also enjoyed creating their own Transfiguration pictures, using olive oil to make Jesus shine!

The all-age service was led by our vicar Joe and focused on the theme of listening to Jesus. We learnt that just as we have to be very quiet to hear a pin drop (or even a feather!), it's important to have some 'quiet time' in order to hear the voice of Jesus speaking to us through the Scriptures or through prayer. The Sunday School contributed many answers to Joe's questions and later led the congregation in singing 'Our God is a great big God." We also read the prayers of intercession, and Thomas read the OT reading about Elijah and Elisha. As always, everyone did very well, and we all enjoyed the refreshments after the service.

On the first Sunday in Lent we learnt about Jesus being tempted in the wilderness and how He used the Word of God in each situation to respond and overcome the temptations. We played a game to make us think about situations in which we may be tempted to say or do 'the wrong thing' (eg cheating in a game, mocking someone, taking something without permission etc.), and we discussed what would be 'the right thing' to do. We had fun making our own 'shields of faith' and using them to fight off any (paper ball) temptations that were coming our way! We also decorated Smarties tubes to help us collect some money during Lent, which will be given to a charity at Easter.

Wishing you all a blessed Lent and great joy in the first signs of spring.



#### Dramatic decline of religion on TV



There is less television being devoted to religion and ethics than there used to be. A *lot* less.

The latest statistics from Ofcom, the industry regulator reveal a dramatic reduction in television programmes about 'religion and ethics' broadcast by the public-service broadcasting networks (PSBs): BBC, ITV, Channel 4 and Channel 5.

Comparing 2022 with 2011, peak time hours of 'first-run' UK origination output fell by 85 per cent; while peak-time hours of 'all origin' output (that is, including bought-in material) fell by 76 per cent. Channel 4 dropped from being the most prolific network to providing no output at all; and the BBC output fell by 65 per cent.

Roger Bolton, a former BBC and ITV executive and independent producer, wrote recently in the Church Times:

"All this has happened without a peep from Ofcom or the boards of the PSBs, who are supposed to protect the public interest. There have been no peeps, either, from religious leaders. They seem to be asleep, or preoccupied with their own internal issues, unaware of this wanton destruction."


"In my opinion, television commissioners ... underestimate the power of religion and the continuing interest in it. They also seem to forget that people are moral creatures, often keen to do the right thing, but wishing to discuss and debate what that is."

#### **Reflecting Faith: Lychgates**

On the moors near to where I used to live in West Yorkshire, there were a couple of large stones with crosses marked on them. Many people thought that they were boundary or marker stones, and in so far as they marked the way towards the oldest church in that area they were. To be more exact, they were on the route towards the oldest churchyard.

In ages past bodies were carried by hand, sometimes over long distances, and there were restrictions placed on where they could be laid to allow the bearers to rest. These two stones were 'resting' stones.

When a body arrived at the church for burial, it would again be put down while the administrative formalities were carried out, and again the bearers could rest. So, a resting stone was placed at the edge or start of the consecrated land around the church.

The priest conducting the funeral would meet the cortege here, not originally out of respect, but rather to receive the required legal certificate for burial before he allowed them to enter the church grounds.


Because of typical English weather - rain and wind - it was usually sheltered, and benches were built for the bearers. There would also be a cross within the construction to signify the start of holy land. This is what today we call the 'lych-gate'; lych coming from the Anglo-Saxon word *lich* or *lic*, related to the modern German word *leiche*, all meaning corpse.

Few old lychgates remain today, as many were destroyed or damaged after the Reformation, and most of those that survived were constructed of timber and have since decayed.

In the eighteenth century, when the use for the resting stones and thus lychgates declined, many were removed and replaced with gates, often retaining the shelter as it continues to be a meeting place for the priest to receive funeral parties.

#### This month

Try and visit a lychgate this month and actually spend a few moments under its shelter. Have a think about what burdens you want to lay down. What do you need to be sheltered from?



# What's the Big Idea? An Introduction to the Books of the Old Testament: Leviticus & Numbers

Editor: **Canon Paul Hardingham** continues this series which will run for the next two years.

These books are concerned with Israel's wandering in the desert, on their journey from slavery in Egypt to the promised land of Canaan.

Leviticus focuses on the regulations about worship, ceremonial cleanness, moral laws and holy days. The key theme is that of *holiness*, as every detail of our lives is affected by the presence of a holy God. The aim of the sacrifices, feast and Sabbaths was to enable the people to enter God's presence. We should see the instructions and practices in Leviticus as pointing to Jesus. He totally fulfilled the law through the sacrifice of His life, as Easter reminds us. He demonstrated the love and holiness of God, so that we can share His life: *'Be holy, because I am holy'* (1 Peter 1:16, cf Lev 11:44-45; 19:2; 20:7).

The book of Numbers tells the story of Israel's journey through the wilderness. The people were coming to terms with their *identity* as God's people and the *call* to serve Him. They didn't always respond with faith, gratitude and obedience, but with unbelief, ingratitude and rebellion. As a result of their refusal to enter Canaan (ch 14), they were condemned to spend the rest of their lives in the desert. However, God in His grace allowed their children to enter the Promised Land. The book reminds us that the Church is called to be a community that honours God, learns how to deal with sin in ourselves and others, and lives out love and justice in daily life.

'The LORD bless you and keep you; the LORD make his face shine upon you and be gracious to you; the LORD turn his face toward you and give you peace.' (Numbers 6:24-26).

#### All in the month of March

**150** years ago, on **30**<sup>th</sup> March **1874** Charles Lightoller, British naval officer, was born. He was Second Officer on the RMS Titanic, and the most senior member of the crew to survive the sinking in 1912. He was also a commanding officer in the Royal Navy during WW1, and took part (as a retired volunteer) in the Dunkirk evacuation in WW2.

**125 years ago, on 6<sup>th</sup> March 1899**, the German pharmaceutical company Bayer patented aspirin (acetylsalicylic acid).

**90 years ago, on 9<sup>th</sup> March 1934**, Yuri Gagarin, Soviet cosmonaut, was born. He was the first man in space. (Died 1968)

**80** years ago, from 24<sup>th</sup> to 25<sup>th</sup> March 1944, the Great Escape took place. 76 Allied prisoners of war broke out of the Stalag Luft III prisoner-of-war camp near Sagan, Germany after digging three tunnels. Three of the prisoners escaped, 73 were recaptured, and 50 were executed. The event was dramatized in the film *The Great Escape*.

75 years ago, on 10<sup>th</sup> March 1949, the 1948 Arab-Israeli War ended. Israeli victory.

**70** years ago, on 1<sup>st</sup> March 1954, the USA tested the most powerful nuclear device it has ever detonated – a thermonuclear hydrogen bomb codename Castle Bravo, at Bikini Atoll, in the Marshall Islands. Due to a design error, the 15-megaton blast was 2.5 times greater than expected, and caused extensive contamination, deaths, burns and birth defects.

**65 years ago, on 9<sup>th</sup> March 1959**, the Barbie doll was launched at the International Toy Fair in New York City. 9<sup>th</sup> March is Barbie's official birthday.

**60 years ago, on 6<sup>th</sup> March 1964,** American world heavyweight boxing champion Cassius Clay was given the name Muhammad Ali, after joining the Nation of Islam.

**50** years ago, on **29**<sup>th</sup> March **1974**, the Terracotta Army was discovered in Shaanxi, China by a group of farmers who were digging a well. The 8,000 life-sized warriors, plus chariots and horses were buried with the first Emperor of China, Qin Shi Huang (247 BC 0 221 BC) to protect him in the afterlife.

**40** years ago, 5<sup>th</sup> March **1984** to March **1985**, the 1984 miners' strike took place. 6000 coal miners in Yorkshire began a strike, to protest against pit closures and job losses. By 12<sup>th</sup> March the strike in Yorkshire became a national one, involving tens of thousands of miners.

30 years ago, on 12th March 1994, the first women priests in the Church of England were ordained.

25 years ago, 21st March 1999, Ernie Wise, British comedian and actor (Morecambe and Wise) died.

**20 years ago, on 30<sup>th</sup> March 2004**, Alistair Cooke, British-born American journalist and broadcaster died. Known for his insightful broadcasts on American culture, in *Letter from America*.

10 years ago, on 18<sup>th</sup> March 2014, Russia annexed Crimea following a controversial referendum in which its citizens voted to separate from Ukraine. Many of those loyal to Ukraine boycotted the referendum, and it was declared illegitimate by the United Nations and western governments. Most countries continue to recognise Crimea as part of Ukraine. Also on 29<sup>th</sup> March 2014, the first same-sex marriages in England and Wales took place.



#### Why we should be like donkeys

Are you a pet-lover? Many people own a dog, a cat or a budgie, but most of us don't own a donkey! Yet in Bible times, donkeys were essential to daily life. They did everything from helping to grind corn, to ploughing, to carrying people, to transporting their belongings. Despite their small frame, donkeys are surprisingly tough. They can survive on poor fodder, can travel an average of 20 miles a day.

There are two occasions in the Christian calendar where donkeys walk into the picture. At Christmas, Mary travelled the 100 miles from Nazareth to Bethlehem on a donkey. And although a donkey doesn't get a specific mention in the manger story, that same one that transported her was probably there; where else would it have been?

On Palm Sunday Jesus entered Jerusalem riding on a donkey. Jesus deliberately chose this animal rather than a horse. Why? In Bible times, the horse was associated with war, conquest and worldly might. But the donkey was a symbol of peace and humility. So, Jesus used this animal to show that He had come with the dignity of the king of peace. His entry into the Holy City also fulfilled Zechariah's prophecy concerning the Messiah.

Donkeys are hardworking and undemanding. They wait for their master to put them to the work He has chosen for them. And, remarkably, each one bears the mark of the Cross on their backs!


Perhaps that is something we should learn—to wait for Jesus our Master, to be always obedient to Him, to serve Him with all our hearts, and to bear the mark of His grace in our lives.

"Well, at £50 an hour for a boat, I am not surprised!"


#### Safeguarding

#### Thanking two kinds of Mother on 10th March

Mothering Sunday, the fourth Sunday in Lent, is the day for honouring our Mother Church, and has been celebrated since the Middle Ages. Mother's Day is an annual day to honour our mothers, and it began in America in May 1907. In the US, Canada, Australia and Mexico, Mother's Day is still held in May. In Britain, Mothers' Day is held on Mothering Sunday, so the two days are often merged in people's minds.

If you ask Google for ideas of how to be nice to your church on that day, you won't find much. But if you want to be kind to your mother that day, you will be spoilt for choice. High on all the lists are suggestions for taking her to lunch, giving flowers, a card, or paying for her to have a day doing something she loves.

Whatever you choose to do, probably the best thing to give your mother must surely be yourself: some time and some love. Remind her of the funny and touching stories of your childhood and thank her for all the things that she did for you. Give her some good company and show her some gratitude. Let her know that you love her and appreciate her.

Remember that the Commandment 'Honour thy father and mother' was the first commandment that came with a promise of blessing on you, if you obey.



#### **God in Music**

## 'Glorious the song when God's the theme' Hildegard of Bingen

In this series we have looked at the psalms of the Old Testament and the songs of the New Testament, and now we enter the Middle Ages. But it is the Middle Ages through the eyes of a record producer in the last century.

In 1980 Ted Perry decided to found a new independent record company, Hyperion. If that was not financial risk enough, in the following year Hyperion issued a CD of a composer virtually unknown in the 1980s – Hildegard of Bingen. The risk paid off, and Gothic Voices' recording of the music of this remarkable medieval nun became a best seller. The CD sold in its thousands and received awards from the gramophone industry.

'A feather on the breath of God', the title of the CD, is how Hildegard described herself. 'Listen, there was a king sitting on his throne. Around him stood great and wonderfully beautiful columns ornamented with ivory, bearing the banners of the king with great honour. Then it pleased the king to raise a small feather from the ground and he commanded it to fly. The feather flew, not because of anything in itself, but because the air bore it along. Thus am I a feather on the breath of God.'


Hildegard was born in 1098, the tenth child of noble parents who lived in western Germany. Aged only eight, she was given into the care of Jutta, abbess of a monastery in the Rhineland, near Bingen. There she lived the life of an enclosed nun, her only contact with the world outside via a grille through which food was passed.

After 30 years, Hildegard left that cell and was assigned a scribe, who wrote down her visions and meditations in two volumes. She founded two monasteries, wrote books on medicine and natural healing and the first morality play, and composed a great range of songs. She corresponded with the great and the good, and as the 'Sybil of the Rhine,' her advice was sought by popes and emperors, by kings and bishops. A truly creative life of prayer and service until her death in 1179.


The starting point for her own compositions was the plainsong of that time. Modern techniques of singing and performing often make plainsong slow and heavy. The secret to bringing plainchant alive is to sing it with relaxed attention. In many ways that is the secret of the life of prayer: that paradox of resting in the Lord while being alert to the promptings of his spirit. Hildegard realised that secret as she brought to her music, as she did to everything, an intensity of emotion and faith, developing the medieval plainchant into melodies that flowed off the page and soared into the skies.

It is all there in the chant 'O ignis spiritus' on the CD – an ecstatic song, praising the life of God's Spirit as breath and spark of flame, as a power within and armour without. As Hildegard contemplates this gift, her music moves and grows, reaching upwards to God's throne of glory in praise and adoration and outwards to those who listen.

### Christ Arose

Up from the grave He arose, With a mighty triumph o'er His foes; He arose a Victor from the dark domain, And He lives forever with His saints to reign, He arose! He arose! Hallelujah! Christ arose!

Vainly they watch His bed, Jesus my Saviour! Vainly they seal the dead, Jesus my Lord!

Death cannot keep his prey, Jesus my Saviour! He tore the bars away, Jesus my Lord!

By Robert Lowry (1826-1899)

This Easter marks the 150<sup>th</sup> birthday of this much-loved hymn, sung each year by millions of Christians worldwide. It all began on a little pump organ in the living room of a college professor in Pennsylvania, back in 1874.

Robert Lowry was professor of literature at Bucknell University, and pastor of a nearby church. He had a passion for poetry and music, and explained his 'muse' this way: "I watch my moods and when anvthing strikes me. whether words or music, no matter where I am, at home, on the street, I jot it down. My brain is a sort of spinning machine, for there is music running through it all the time. Sometimes the words come, and the music follows."

Easter 1874 was approaching, and on this particular day Robert Lowry had been meditating on the gospel narratives of the Passion and Resurrection. The angel's words at the empty tomb, 'He is not here, but is risen' kept running through his mind. There was something there... Lowry moved to the little pump organ in his living room and gave himself up to the moment. Soon the words and the music for this joyous Easter hymn just fell into place.


